## Our Community

Oakmont Regional High School serves students from the towns of Ashburnham and Westminster. These towns, located in North Central Massachusetts, are considered rural/residential in character. Beautiful lakes, scenic trails, and close proximity to Mount Wachusett make this an attractive area in which to reside. While there are a number of large employers, easy access to Rt. 2 also means many commute to and from Boston.

## Our School

Oakmont educates students in grades 9 through 12 with an enrollment of approximately 689 pupils (September 2018). A strong college preparatory curriculum is offered including Honors and Advanced Placement courses. Our varied curriculum includes an innovative technology program as well as numerous co-curricular activities. Oakmont operates on a 4 x 4 semesterized block schedule, which began in September 1997. All classes are 83 minutes long, with the vast majority of them running for one semester and earning one full credit. One-half of a credit is awarded in Fitness, Health, Computers & Careers, Global Skills, Learning Center and Band and/or Chorus. Book Smart, Journalism, Creative Writing and 3D Design are also offered half-credit. New half credit courses this year are ELA & Math SAT Prep, Human Anatomy & Physiology Visceral (HAPV), and Animation. Seniors are also allowed to waive Fitness in lieu of other athletic pursuits.

**Honors and College Prep Coursework:** Rigorous course sections are designated with a clear "H" on the transcript. All other core academic courses are taught at the college preparatory level with the exception of Grade 9 courses: Practical Math, Practical English, Foundations in Reading and Biology Essentials.

**Advanced Placement:** AP courses are clearly designated as such on student transcripts. These unique courses provide a college level challenge, as established by national guidelines, and are pursued by our most intellectually curious students.

English, Math, History and Art courses are offered annually, whereas Music, Science and Foreign Language are only available upon demand.

## Unique Programs

Dual/Supplemental Enrollment-college level course work is available to qualified juniors and seniors at MWCC and Fitchburg State University.

Independent Research (IR)-qualified juniors and seniors may design a credited course not currently offered at Oakmont with the support of an academic advisor, typically offered at the CP level, with an option to take at Honors level.

Career Internships are available for academic credit to qualified seniors, student's work 7 hours a week in a placement related to a possible career choice and are supervised by a worksite mentor and faculty advisor.

Students may volunteer for Community or In-School Service at any time during their high school career, though not for academic credit. In-School Service such as Teacher-Aide/Teacher Assistant may be used when class options are limited.

## Grade Point Average and Class Rank

All courses are included in GPA and Rank calculations. Rank in class is determined by a weighted QPA. QPA (quality point average) is calculated based on final grade and level of course difficulty. Grade Point Average is un-weighted and is based on grade only.
